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CHANGES TO WOBURN SANDS NEWSLETTER

After many years of collating and editing the Woburn Sands Town Council Newsletter and submitting content for the monthly Hogsty End, Cllr Jackie Jeffries has stepped down and her place has been taken by Cllr Richard Lanyon-Hogg and Cllr Jo Green aided by Alison Jordan, the Town Clerk. The Town Council would like to thank Jackie for the work she has put into both these publications.

As a part of the change, there is a slight alteration to the timings of the newsletter. EAST WEST RAIL

By the time of the publication of the current newsletter, East West Rail will have run a public drop-in session for Woburn Sands. The aim of the event was to enable members of the public to meet and speak to members of the project team.

EWR is still in the process of reviewing the feedback received during the second Non-Statutory Consultation and so do not have any new information to provide now, they want to listen to local views and will offer as much information as possible at this stage.

Contract Update

Whilst we await news of the EWR plans for the line passing through Woburn



Sands, the Department for Transport (DfT) is preparing to set aside almost £2.7bn to pay for contracts for the delivery of the next stages of East West Rail (EWR).

As you will be aware, EWR is a new high-speed rail line between Oxford and Cambridge that is being overseen by East West Rail Co. (EWR Co.), an organisation specially created by the DfT, rather than Network Rail. Work is currently underway on Connection Stage 1, which is seeing the line built from Oxford to Bletchley (Milton Keynes), with a delivery date of early 2025.

The rest of the line is split into Connection Stage 2 (CS2), which will see the line extended from Bletchley to Bedford and Connection Stage 3 (CS3), which will see it taken from Bedford to Cambridge.

Previously, the funding for building CS2 and CS3 had not been assured, but the DfT has recently updated its commercial pipeline document and has outlined six forthcoming EWR contracts. These include a £676M contract for the delivery partner on CS2 and CS3 and a £1.12bn contract for civils work.



CLIMATE SURVEY

Results of Woburn Sands Town Council's Community survey ... On proposals for reducing transport-related carbon emissions and promoting a healthier local environment for both people and wildlife.

This survey, produced by the Woburn Sands Climate Change Group on behalf of the Town Council, was distributed throughout the town and put up on the TC's website in January, 2022. A total of 379 completed survey forms were eventually returned from about 3400 delivered. The survey form and a summary of the numerical results (as bar charts showing proportions of graded positive to negative responses to each question) can be accessed as downloadable pdf files on the TC website (please ask at the TC if you can't access them).

Concerning **transport** (Section A of the survey), most respondents were evidently keen to reduce the impact of excessive motor traffic on the town and to encourage more walking and cycling. Thus there were substantial overall majorities (>75%) in favour of Woburn Sands becoming a 'Low Traffic Neighbourhood', with a uniform 20mph speed limit throughout the town, and also for a campaign to discourage engine-idling. Clear majorities (>60%) also supported making the High Street more pedestrian-friendly and



extending the MK Redway network within Woburn Sands, and a sizeable minority called for more cycle racks (46% for; 12% against). Addition of new pedestrian crossings likewise received more support (46%) than opposition (17%); but more respondents opposed, than supported having a one-way traffic system in the town (38% for; 42% against).

There was overall majority support all the proposals concerning for environment and biodiversity (Section B), with substantial majorities (>75%) in favour of more trees being planted around the town, and more wildflower growth on some grassed areas and in hanging baskets to help conserve pollinating insects, as well as the installation of bird and bat boxes on trees and TC buildings. Clear majorities (>60%) also supported street lighting being switched off in the early hours of the morning, and completely ending the use of herbicides on TC land, to reduce the impact of light and chemical pollution on wildlife.

The Town Council considered these responses at its monthly meeting on May 9th 2022 and the following actions were approved:

- As most of the proposals in Section A would require the approval of Milton Keynes Council, especially its Highways Department, we will send them the results from that section of the survey and request a meeting with their officers to explore the possibilities for action on those measures that received substantial, or clear majority support (with more specific local consultation conducted where needed).
- Most of the proposals in Section B, by contrast, can be progressed directly by the TC, and some are already being acted on, such as the planting of trees from the 'Queen's Green Canopy' Jubilee Project around the town and encouraging wildflower growth and seed-set in part of Mowbray Green by not mowing over the spring and early summer, and by modifying the planting regime for our planters and hanging baskets in favour of a more pollinator-friendly make-up. Other measures will be pursued as resources allow.


JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

BOWLS CLUB CELEBRATES CENTENARY

The Woburn Sands Bowls Club celebrates its Centenary this year. There was an initial membership of 41 men – no ladies were allowed until 1958. Originally there were four rinks but this was extended in 1958 to six rinks.

In 2015 the Club moved from their premises in what is now the Greens complex to new premises off Common Lane. The Club enjoys an excellent Clubhouse, a first class green, and four artificial rinks allowing members to play throughout the year. There are some 160 members which makes it one of the largest in the area. 
LIBRARY NEWS

CELEBRATING THE WSTC YOUNG ENVIRONMENTALIST AWARDS 2022



We are pleased to report that our Young Environmentalist Awards took place as part of the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations held on Saturday June 4th 2022 on Mowbray Green.

We send our appreciation to all those young people who took part and are now giving WSTC the opportunity to highlight their environmental actions and interests to the wider community. We also wish to express our gratitude to all those in our community who enabled young people to take part in the awards, so our thanks go to parents, carers, and guardians as well as those involved with St Michael's Church, Swallowfield and Fulbrook Schools.

Big thanks also go to...

Frosts for providing gifts for all participants and gift vouchers to those receiving special awards. We are pleased to report that entrants were highly delighted and appreciative. Milton Keynes Council were also able to provide small items to encourage recycling activities.

WSTC were supported in the judging of the Award by **Bob Holland**, a resident of



our community who many of you will know from his environmental work in support of Edgewick Farm, he was a key player in the judging process. We are very grateful to him for his expertise.

YEA! Aims, Objectives and Outcomes We wanted to find a way of recognising the positive environmental actions that Woburn Sands Young Environmentalists are engaged in and to showcase their activities. Thus, we began publicising the WSTC Young Environmentalist Awards. We had a display and entry forms in the library and information on our website, notice boards and in our newsletter. Local families, local schools and church communities all took an interest in the awards idea.

In total 37 young people between the ages of 5 and 15 took part in the awards. They all gained a WSTC Young Environmentalist Certificate for their efforts. 34 entrants received a range of small items to encourage them in their recycling and a bird box to paint, along with their certificate. The 3 winners of special awards received a range of different items such as a bird feeder, a bug hotel or wildflower seeds and a



Frosts gift voucher to spend on items of their choice, along with their certificate. Every certificate was accompanied by remarks from the judges which recognised the positive contribution to their environment the young people were trying to make.

Showcasing Young People's Interests and Activities

Completed entry forms arrived at the WSTC in May accompanied by evidence of individual actions and thoughts which were illustrated in a range of ways such as videos, pictures and drawings, photographs, and writing. The entries set out young people's environmental concerns.

Here are just some examples of what our young people said in relation to:

The need to reduce environmental harm contributed to by littering pollution, especially plastic pollution.

Picking up plastic helps the environment and I do it so the world will stay healthy and plastic free for the future generations to come (Isabel 14yrs)

I try to keep my school clean and tidy by picking up litter (Alexander 6yrs)

While we were cycling we found lots of rubbish on the pathways, people throwing their rubbish out of their car windows so we decided to grab a litter picker and a black bag and a recycling bag to pick up the litter. It's bad for the environment and it doesn't look nice (Lily 8yrs)

To increase and improve where possible all forms of recycling and reuse.

I recycle at home with my mum and dad and I always check that they've put it in the right bin as dad sometimes gets it wrong (Clara 7yrs)

We went into the woods to collect unused plastic tree protectors we picked up lots of bags full of them it felt very good to do it because there are lots of sharp edges and they could have injured the wildlife that we saw like rabbits and birds so it was good to help them (Finley 14yrs)

I reused old furniture that was waiting to go to the tip, old toys and clothes to make a scarecrow. I had lots of fun saving the environment especially making my scarecrow Bob (Jasper 7yrs)

To encourage everyone to be more thoughtful and careful about the use of fossil fuel driven energy.

I scoot to school to help with pollution, it means there are less cars (**Stanley 7yrs**)

At home I'm responsible for turning the lights and TV off if no one is using them. I'm inspired by David Attenborough (Lorima 8yrs)

I like to conserve energy by switching off lights and electrics at home and school (Gracie-Mae 9yrs)

To look for simple ways to encourage and support wildflowers, pollination, and the bee population in our town.



I put a bee house in my back garden. Then I put sunflower seeds around it to attract the bees. So will pollinate the flowers. I enjoy watching the bees visit the house (Daisy Mae 7yrs)

I have planted flowers to attract and help bees. We need bees to pollinate (**Daisy 8**)

I think it's important that we all have bee friendly flowers in our gardens to encourage them so that it helps the local plants and farmers with their crops for us all to have food (Archie 9yrs)

To find ways to actively encourage a healthy and diverse bug population in our gardens.

I have got a bug hotel. We need insects for a healthy garden or vegetable patch (Molly 6yrs)

I created a bug home with twigs old fruit skins and the bugs moved in to make compost (Isabella 9yrs)

To create the best possible environment to support our bird population and access to sources of food.

I made some bird feeders out of toast peanut butter and bird seed I put them in the garden and around Parklands to attract more birds (Holly 6yrs)

I like to see birds feeding and having a bath and making nests in the box to help them live (Ella 6yrs)

I want to do my part for the earth so I've been planting fruit and vegetable seeds

(Ellie 9yrs)

I dug a hole planted the tree and fertilised it with horse manure and straw (Henry 9yrs)

Our Special Award Winners

We were able to present three of our young people with special awards for their excellent entries. All are pupils at Swallowfield school, they were Phoebe aged 5 years for her detailed and creative ways to promote environmental awareness and to fund litter picking tools and Archie and Holly aged 5 and 9 years who had put their ideas into positive actions to support the bird and bee population, as well as taking action to create a mini meadow.

In The Future

It was very encouraging to see our young environmentalists taking action in their homes, schools and out in our local green spaces to create a healthier environment for people and wildlife in the future. We wish them all the very best in their environmental activities going forward.

Now the Awards are over for 2022 we want to share the ideas from the award entries to meet another of the main aims of the awards which was to stimulate other members of our community to engage in environmentally friendly changes now to contribute positively to lives in Woburn Sands in the future, the environment that our young people will grow up in. You can look forward to seeing more about the ideas and thoughts that the young people We will also be in discussion with had. schools, local organisations, and groups to see how we can take the awards forward in the future.

NETWORK RAIL FOOTPATHS

Network Rail are going to be working on two footpath schemes, one widening the path along Cranfield Road and one through the Recreation Ground, both designed to provide safer walking routes near the level crossing. It is unfortunate that despite pressure from the Town Council to build a bridge to replace the old School Crossing, this will not be the case.

Work on the former will be weekdays from 9.30-16.00 Tuesday 28th June-Tuesday 19th June and the latter weekdays from Thursday 21st July-Friday 19th August.

UPDATE ON SUPPORT FOR THE HIGH STREET

Following the success of the High Street map and information leaflet, the Woburn Sands High Street tote bags, and the new High Street notice board in the car park, all of which were supported by the Additional Regeneration Grant backed Milton Keynes Council, The Town Council will be applying for funding from the Economic Regeneration Grant to improve the infrastructure of the High Street. This will include amongst other things an external power supply on the Memorial Green side of the Institute, a new bench on the Memorial Green and repairs to the seat by the bus stop.
